aving shown in the previous months articles the benefits of Holy Communion, the Biblical and historical practice of the Lord's Supper and the Lutheran heritage of frequent Communion, this month I hope to answer some common objections to offering Communion more frequently. Perhaps the most common objection to having the Lord's Supper more frequently is it will become too common. In a sense this makes sense because leftover turkey in the days after Thanksgiving becomes wearisome and our favorite dessert served at every meal for months on end may make you wish for something else to eat. It is the way of our sinful flesh to become satiated and desire change. We take our good gifts from God: our spouse, family, work, country, or freedom for granted. Taking it for granted doesn't lessen the fact that they are good gifts. The blessings of the Lord's Supper come not from how we think of it, whether we think of it as too common or super special: it comes from the blessings that God has attached to it. We should not compare the Lord's Supper

to other good things in life because it is
Jesus coming to us Himself. In the same way we may
say that the weekly sermon has become too
common, the weekly prayers have become too
common, or the weekly hymn singing has become
too common. Potential misuse of the Lord's
Sacrament should not keep us from using it properly
and with all the blessings attached to it.

The second most common objection is that it will take too much time. At St. Jakobi we are fortunate with the size of the sanctuary that we don't have to have multiple services on Sunday morning and worry about the early service running into the late service. In addition, we have a wide Communion rail that allows many people to receive Communion at once. The additional time that Communion requires is very small compared to the amount of time we spend doing other activities during the week. To add 15 minutes to the service is very inconsequential when we know that we can sit

for 90-120 minute movies (children included). That said, there could be some adjustments made to how people are dismissed for Communion and how they approach the rail that would speed up the distribution. The Board of Elders will be discussing those possibilities in the future.

Another objection is that **forgiveness is** received during the Confession and Absolution so there is no need to have more frequent Communion for forgiveness. Yes, God has instituted several ways for His people to receive forgiveness, but the reception of Holy Communion is more than just receiving forgiveness. It's being united to Him who is the vine, and we the branches.

It is being united to those who worship in heaven and on earth; the unity of the Christian

Church. It is about being transformed by the holiness of Christ to live in

holiness. There is more to Holy Communion than forgiveness; it is Jesus himself.

Another objection is that Lutherans don't have Communion every week; that's something Roman Catholics do.

As I have pointed out in previous months, more frequent Communion is a Biblical practice. That Roman Catholics do it shouldn't discourage or

encourage us. As Lutherans, we don't look to other denominations to understand how to be faithful. We look to Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions to learn how to be faithful to our Lord.

Finally, another objection may be I don't want to sit in the pew while everyone else receives Communion. This discussion has been about offering Communion, not requiring that Communion be received. Currently there are people who sit in the pews and don't receive Communion. If you wish not to receive Communion that is something you can choose to do. No one should look at another person and try to judge them based on whether they do or do not receive Communion.

I pray that as you consider these words of encouragement that you would desire to receive Jesus Christ who is the Bread of Life to nourish your soul.

LETTER FROM SEMINARIAN ALEX LANGE

Dear members of St. Jakobi,

I have great news to share with you in this letter. God has made me a father! Rachel is pregnant with our first child! We are so excited and thankful. The baby should be born sometime in September, which gives us plenty of time to pack, move, unpack, and get settled before the birth. Who knows? Perhaps my child will be my first baptism. Please add our child to your prayers.

Talk about a crazy year! On the one hand, so much has happened. I've become a father, I'm nearly finished with my winter quarter, and I'm half way through the calling process. On the other hand, it feels like I just got back from vicarage and unpacked my stuff. Where has the time gone? What more does our Father have in store for me?

You may remember my busy class load that I had last quarter. I certainly learned a lot about the Bible, church history, and counseling. My class load has been a little lighter this winter quarter, and yet, I'm still learning a lot. I've been learning about different religions and worldviews in my World Religions class and my Religious Bodies in America class. What I enjoy most about these classes is how much I learn about Christianity by comparing it to other religions and worldviews. I'm also taking a class on the Epistles of Paul. For the first few weeks we studied the life of Paul and now we are studying in depth the Epistle to the Romans. I've really enjoyed studying this incredibly important letter of Paul and learning about God's faithfulness to his promises and his grace given to all, both Jew and Gentile.

I've started taking a Dale Carnegie class on Wednesday evenings. I know it might seem odd that I would take yet another class on top of all my other classes. However, one of the counseling professors here recommended it to me. He said that it really helps guys become more aware of their mannerisms and helps them build important social skills. The classes cover an incredible number of topics, including remembering names, public speaking, carrying on a conversation, and the like. Since I will begin my ministry soon, I thought it would be a great opportunity to finetune my social skills. After all, I have spent quite some time cloistered in the tower of academia.

Recently I was interviewed by a congregation for a call. Several members of the church came to the seminary and interviewed several seminarians. The interview went well and I enjoyed it, but it was all surreal. It really nailed home how close my call is; before I know it I will be called "Pastor" and carry out the noble task of preaching, baptizing, absolving, admonishing, and overseeing God's flock. I have been told that I have another interview coming up soon. I am really excited to find out where I am being sent on April 29th!


This winter I've been doing some traveling. During the holidays, I got to visit my family in Oregon. After the quarter ends, I will go with some classmates to Arizona for a Best Practices Conference. At this conference I have opportunities to hear pastors discuss some "best practices" for various aspects of ministry, such as worship, counseling, teaching, preaching, and the like. It will also give me a chance to spend some quality time with my classmates. To be honest, the thought of us all being scattered to the four corners of the earth makes me said. I have developed lots

of great friendships over these four years and I will really miss these guys. Thankfully, the world is a small place and our Synod is even smaller. So, I should have opportunities to see them all again.

Finally, I'm taking a class called Systematic IV, a class devoted to answering questions about the Church and the Ministry. That class will be taught by Dr. Biermann. He is one of the reasons I came to Concordia Seminary. I really admire him, but I have not had the opportunity to take him for a class yet. Now, I finally get to!

Yes, there is a lot of exciting things in my future. Thank you for celebrating with me these gifts God has granted me.
